# Endeavour Christian College Annual Report 2016 (Based on 2015 data)

### Characteristics of the Student Body:

127 full time students. 57 males, 70 females. 36 Indigenous students – 14 males, 22 females.

### Distinctive Curriculum Offerings:

Aside from regular subject delivered on campus, we offered Robotics to Years 7, 8 & 9. Students also had an intensive program in Study Skills. Manual Arts was offered as intensive subject (over a limited time frame) in a make-shift workspace, and students participated in cooking in the commercial kitchen in the PCYC.

Primary age children with identified learning needs undertook the *Move To Learn* program.

### Extra-curricular Activities:

Students participated in our annual Cross Country, Athletics and Swimming carnivals. A small number of students went on to participate in Peninsula Sports. Junior Primary classes participated in swimming lessons in Term 1, and all students participated for the the majority of Term 4.

Students in Year 1/2 had an evening incursion, while all other year levels had external camps. Staff from the Queensland Fire and Rescue Service held fire safety sessions for all students.

The majority of students participated in the Cooktown ANZAC Day parade (with some students laying wreaths), the Discovery Festival, and the Remembrance Day commemoration.

A small but significant number of students participate in the Yuku-Baja-Miluku Wildlife Rangers program each week.

Opportunities to participate in Performing Arts came through entries in the Cooktown Show, where 5 students won prizes for their art work, 'Cooktown's Got Talent', in which student singers and dancers performed, and in the Cairns Eisteddfod to which College sent a Primary choir. One of our Year 9 students was a regional finalist in *Queensland Writing For Life* competition. Students also entered the Heart Foundation *Colouring For a Cause* competition. A professional dancer led a workshop for our secondary students. For the first time students participated in the Duke of Edinburgh program.

A weekly bible study involved a number of dedicated students.

### **Social Climate:**

Students are involved in learning in an environment where they feel safe and valued.

Staff model and encourage students to display Christian values of kindness towards one another, including respect, honesty and integrity.

Strong rapport between staff and students assists in promptly identifying, then addressing, signs of student disengagement and all forms of bullying behaviours. This strong rapport, and differentiated pedagogy, ensure a safe and purposeful learning environment where students are positively engaged in learning and in developing pro-social behaviours.

Staff highly value the trust parents and carers place in us as we partner with them in the education of their children. We strive to build and maintain effective communication with parents and carers on all matters.

Staff are intentional in reinforcing, through encouragement and recognition, student progress and achievement, and character development. This occurs less formally in our weekly assemblies and more formally at our end of year Awards Night.

Junior School and Secondary School leaders are selected each year. In the second part of this year the student leaders ran a breakfast club, providing toast and spreads for students before school started.

Student welfare and pastoral care form an integral part of our school environment. Our goal at Endeavour Christian College is for all students to enjoy a high level of emotional, social, physical and spiritual wellbeing.

Staff members and students work as a community to support one another in all areas of school life. Student Welfare Officers aim to provide social and emotional support for our school community. The College has comprehensive Child Protection and Anti-Bullying Policies.

### **Parental Involvement:**

A key initiative in second semester was the 'Support a Reader' program in which parent volunteers worked on a regular, individual basis with students to improve skills and confidence in reading. Parent volunteer involvement was crucial in the success of our Athletics and Swimming carnivals, and also camps.

While recognising the value of parent volunteers to the College, it is our aim in 2016 to formalise parental involvement in the College. This is likely occur through the development of consultative groups including a P & F and 'strategic direction' teams.

We request parents to notify the College office either by phone or email by 9:00am on the day of absence. If absence is unknown by 9:20am, the College student services office contacts parents reminding them to contact the office to advise of their child's absence.
